As the world's biggest employer, expanded decent work measures are critical to ECD outcomes




790 million people are without access to safe water -- one of the most significant underlying factors in diseases causing childhood deaths and developmental delays.

Managing these impacts requires an approachef integrated with local services.



Child Rights Findings in Human Rights Impact Assessments



Some highlights:

- Wages and decent work provisions; child care and maternity challenges; especially for women, migrating workforces
- Opportunities for young workers
- Child labour and abuse in value chains
- Staff conduct and child safeguards as well as efforts on sexual exploitation
- Tourism products that facilitate child rights
- Land acquisition, construction and development phases
- Water and sanitation; the environment and other basic services

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

UNGP 18

Responsibility

- Identify and assess any actual or potential adverse human rights impacts;
 - involving external human rights expertise
 - meaningful consultation with relevant stakeholders, including children

Human Rights Due Diligence

- Assessing the human rights context
- Projecting how the proposed activity and associated business relationships could have adverse human rights impacts



Ensuring Child Rights in Human Rights Impact Assessments

How -- Applying the UNGP and CRBP

- ØAssess the context, including human/child rights issues and projecting how business relationships could have adverse impacts
- ØDraw on human rights expertise
- ØInvolve meaningful consultation with potentially affected groups and other skateholders INCLULDING CHILDREN; also engages local stakeholders for follow up
- ØValue Chain Analysis with perspective to mitigation measures
